## A Special Place For Special Kittens

The three kittens, all girls, started their lives in very difficult and different circumstances. The little orange tabby was born on a farm in Southern Maryland. Her life wasn't too bad . . . there was some food available, and she had the other kittens to play with. She just had to steer clear of the horses and farm equipment. However, this little kitten was very curious and decided to wander off the farm and onto a Wildlife Sanctuary called Jug Bay Wetlands. Eventually, she wandered so far, she couldn't find her way back. Lost and now very hungry, the little kitten aimlessly meandered around the area. After a long time, she heard voices and smelled human food. Not knowing what else to do, she headed towards the delicious smells. What she didn't realize was that she was inadvertently crashing a wedding reception. While the caterer wasn't pleased that a small, dirty kitten was getting into the food, by following her nose, the kitten saved her own life.

Several guests at the wedding reception noticed the small kitten and feeling sorry for her, decided to take her home. Her story might have ended happily, except the little kitten, now called Gabby (Gabrielle was too big a name for such a tiny thing) tested positive for Feline Leukemia (FELV). Her new home already had another cat, so her future was once again in limbo.

While Gabby was lost in Southern Maryland, another young cat, a pretty Burmese look-alike found herself just as lost in a rural area of Virginia.

This shy little girl had a home, but sadly she wasn't wanted. Her family decided to release her into an area where other cats congregated and were fed. Unfortunately, the other cats didn't accept her and chased her away. One of them even bit her on the tail, causing a bad infection. One day a caring person was feeding the cats in that area. The pretty girl was so hungry she worked up the nerve to sneak out for some food. By now the infection in her tail was so bad that half of her tail was dead tissue, and dragged on the ground behind her. The kindly caregiver noticed the scared little kitty and quickly made arrangements to get her to a veterinarian. The veterinarian did what she was able for the little kitty, but had bad news: the cat tested positive for Feline Leukemia and could not be returned to live with the other cats. The cat, now named Anna after the character from The King and I, was once again without a home. A few weeks later, a little torti kitten was born under a house in one of the most impoverished areas of Maryland's Eastern Shore. Despite her spunky cuteness, the family living in the house couldn't afford "another mouth to feed" and turned her over to an animal rescue group. While preparing the kitten for a new home, she was tested for several diseases, one of which was Feline Leukemia.

## Rude Ranch Responds to Florida Animal Hoarder Case

Executive Director Bob Rude decided it was time to make a trip to Florida. Most people go to Florida to enjoy the sun, beaches and Mickey Mouse. Bob headed south as part of a deployment by the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) to help care for nearly 700 cats and kittens in Gainesville.
These animals were seized by the Alachua County Animal Services in response to reports of cats and and kittens at a local rescue that weren't

Bob was deployed by the National Disaster Animal Response Team (NDART) not knowing exactly what his duties would be once he arrived in Gainesville. He found himself splitting time as chief kitty cook (it takes a lot of kibble to feed 700 cats and kittens) and team leader for animal care. The days were long and very hot, but every day Bob and the other volunteers made sure the animals were well cared for before heading out for the day.

Bob felt honored to serve with so many dedicated volunteers who put their lives on hold to make sure the cats and kittens would have every possible chance for a happy, healthy life.

We would like to go into more detail on the condition of the animals, but for now they are part of a court case and are currently considered evidence. More details can be released once a judge makes a decision on the case or the people voluntarily sign the animals over to Animal Services. Until then, suffice it to say that without the help of organizations like HSUS's NDART their fate would not have been as bright.

Your generous support of groups like Rude Ranch and HSUS is what allows us to provide emergency aid to deserving animals like these and others who need our help.

I love the shiny balls and strings that humans put on the scratching post. Last year I pulled them off and batted them all over! But when my humans saw me playing with all these toys, they got mad and yelled at me! What did I do wrong?

Dear Loves the Holidays,
I agree, the holidays, with all the sparkly lights, decorations,
 and food is exciting! Don't forget all the cool wrapping paper and ribbon just waiting to be shredded! Unfortunately, for your own safety, most of this stuff, even the special holiday food, should be off limits to you.

All those shiny balls and strings and even the big pine scratching post are called decorations. These are special things (sometimes even called family heirlooms) that humans save and admire around this time every year. Its very important that the humans keep these things away from you (even though they are really tempting). The shiny balls are made of glass and can break if knocked down or you hit them too hard. You can cut your paw (or the humans could hurt themselves) on the broken glass. You should also stay away from all the shiny strings (garland and tinsel) and ribbons. If you bite some and accidently swallow it, you will end up having to swallow the whole thing (the way your tongue is designed you won't
be able to pull the ribbon out by yourself). If you do accidently eat it, really bad things can happen to your intestines and you could end up at the emergency vet.

You also should stay away from the big pine scratching post, also known as a Christmas tree. Even though it's really fun to sink your claws in and climb up (like our big wild ancestors), if you don't balance perfectly the whole thing can fall with you in it. Not only is it really scary, but there is no way you will be able to make it look like the dog did it! Make sure your humans get a sturdy stand for the tree and tie it to the wall. Unfortunately, she tested positive, meaning her chances of being adopted were very small. However, everyone loved the kitten's spunky playful nature and wanted to make sure she got every opportunity available. Hoping that the results of her original blood tests were an anomaly, she was kept in a cage in a separate area for several weeks. Unfortunately, the second test results were the same: she still had the Feline Leukemia virus in her blood. The rescuers now had a difficult decision to make; the kitten, who they named Shelly, had little or no chance of finding a home, she couldn't be with the other cats, and it wasn't fair to Shelly to live in a cage for the rest of her life. Even more disheartening, more kittens were coming in and the group was running out of space. Shelly either had to find a place to go or be euthanized.

All three of these kittens were running out of alternatives when their caretakers contacted Rude Ranch to see if there was a place for them. Fortunately for Gabby, Anna and Shelly we were able to help.

After Gabby's family realized she carried the leukemia virus, they found that their resident cat, Fergus was positive for Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV), another feline disease. Wanting a companion for Fergus, they adopted an FIV cat waiting to come into Rude Ranch. In return, Gabby came to Rude Ranch's leukemia area and quickly made friends with Whiskey and Oliver, the leukemia area's welcoming committee.

Shelly arrived a few weeks later after hitching a ride with several other cats and dogs on their way to a low cost spay/neuter clinic. After living most of her life confined to a cage, Shelly loved the freedom and physical activity being in an unconfined area with other cats. Unfortunately, her muscles and coordination skills atrophied
while she was confined to the cage. After several spills and collisions with other cats, she quickly made up for lost time and was soon out-playing and out-running her roommates.

Anna was the last to arrive. Unfortunately, the massive infection in her tail still needed intensive treatment, including removing the dead tissue. Although she wasn't pleased with the treatment, Anna was a good patient and healed quickly. She soon moved in with Shelly, Gabby and the rest of Rude Ranch's FELV cats. While Anna isn't as outgoing, she sincerely appreciates having a nice, dry bed to sleep in, the air conditioning, and plenty of food.

Gabby and Shelly made fast friends with Whiskey and Sugar, two of their older roommates and frequently curl up together for naps. Pewter, who is still the prankster of the area does her best to get them both in trouble.
Morris, a Hurricane Katrina evacuee and the oldest in the area watches over them all like
a protective father.

Although the leukemia virus may shorten their lives, Gabby, Shelly and Anna are all happy to be alive and enjoy life here at Rude Ranch.
