## Teaching An Old Dog New Tricks

We don't know where he came from, or how he ended up here, but he did. The big red dog announced his presence a few days before we actually saw him. At least we are pretty sure it was him that knocked over all the Rude Ranch recycling and trash cans searching for food. It might have been on one such trip scrounging for scraps that we spotted the hungry dog. It

didn't take much to catch the old pit bull . . . his joints must have ached as he walked slowly with very stiff legs. Even a slow trot seemed like an effort for him. Once we brought him inside, we could see how beat up he was. He had lots of scars, cuts and abrasions all over his body. He had spots of mange on his ears and face. The bones along his spine and sides stood out. He gulped his first meal of regular dog food with complete joy.

It only took a few minutes and a couple of blood tests to

figure out why he was so stiff and achy. In addition to his ten plus years of age, he had advanced lyme disease, heartworm, hook worm, deer ticks and fleas. We immediately started him on antibiotics for the lyme disease and dewormers for the parasites. Unfortunately, he needed to be a lot stronger and healthier before he could be treated for heartworm. Exhausted from his earlier scrounging and vet visit, the old dog settled into a soft dog bed and quickly fell into a deep sleep. Knowing that he was well fed

and safe, he slept peacefully the entire night.

tell at one point in his life he was a handsome dog and his fur was probably a shiny russet color. With this in mind, we decided to call him "Big Red".

Although we could see in Big Red's eyes he was grateful to be warm, dry and well fed, we could also tell he was not feeling well. Going outside for a walk was still an effort for him. He often "did his

business" quickly and wanted to go back to his kennel, where he promptly fell asleep. Several days later, we noticed a difference in Big Red. His cuts and bruises were healing. He didn't have as much trouble getting up after a nap. He walked with a little spring in his step and actually seemed to enjoy himself. Soon, the spots of mange were gone and his bald patches started to fill in. Not only did Big Red enjoy his walks, he happily trotted from tree to tree, sniffing, exploring

and marking this new territory. The antibiotics were successfully treating his lyme disease, and the parasites were no longer attacking his body. He was getting stronger and feeling better every day!

Although he was feeling better, Big Red still had a major problem: heartworm. Treating heartworm can be dangerous to dogs at any age, let alone an older dog with other health issues. However, without the treatment the parasites would eventually destroy his heart and vascular system. Additionally, once treatment started, Big Red, the dog that had rediscovered the joys


to our table. There was something about him that people iust couldn't resist. From the time we found him in the middle of a country road until the end of his life, he was our best friend.

of running and playing, would have to stay in a crate 24 hours a day for the next 30 days.

Although we were worried about the risks the treatment posed, we felt it was necessary to give Big Red a longer, healthier life. We were also worried about how to keep him away from noise, excitement and distractions during his recovery. While life at the shelter wasn't overly stressful, a dog undergoing heartworm treatment must be kept quiet and non-active to avoid any chance of an embolism; the heart itself has to rest. The day-to-day life at Rude Ranch, with deliveries, visitors, and other dogs and cats stopping by could generate too much excitement for Big Red.

Fortunately, Rude Ranch animal caretaker Andrea and her family liked Big Red, and thought they could care for him during the treatment. After all, everyone in her family would be at work during the day and the house would be quiet. They could keep him in a crate in a bedroom, away from the other family pets.

Shortly afterwards, Big Red started his treatment, which consisted of two shots into his spinal area. The injection sites were quite painful and for the first few days Big Red was almost happy to stay in his crate. Fortunately, Big Red made it through those first critical days with no problems. Although he still had several weeks of crate rest ahead of him, he started to get restless, trying to figure ways out of his crate. Knowing he was still at a high risk of an embolism or stroke, Andrea was at a loss to figure out how to keep him quiet. That's when one of her cats snuck into Big Red's room and hissed at him. Turns out that a single hiss from the cat sent Big Red into the back of his crate. For the rest of his recovery, (except for one unauthorized car ride to the local McDonald's drivethru) as long as the cat sat in front of his crate, Big Red

was very content to lie quietly in the back. Sensing his new found power over the dog, the cat was very happy to sit in front of Big Red's crate and stare him down.

Big Red finished his 30 days of crate rest without further incident. After his treatment he continued to build muscle and learn how to behave in a normal household. Andrea's family gave him a sweater for Christmas that he wore to have his picture taken with Santa.

Although he still needs to be neutered, Big Red has come a long way from the creaky, achy, too painful to walk dog that found his way to Rude Ranch last fall. He now runs and plays with other dogs and enjoys going for walks and rides in the car. He is, however, still working on his relationship with Andrea's cat.
