### Surprise!

Lucy, Tina, Sandy and Buffy were a family. Lucy and Buffy were sisters and had lived at the farm for a couple of years. They were working cats. They lived in

a barn in Lothian, MD. Their job was to keep the mice, rats and other rodents away from the hay and straw in the barn. They also patrolled the yard to keep it free of moles and voles. The cats were good at their jobs. The humans living on the property made sure the cats had plenty of food and water. The cats were semiferal, and didn't let the property owners touch them. Despite the lack of contact, the relationship worked out well for both the property owners and the cats.

Although everything with the

cats was working out, last spring the property owners knew they soon would have a problem: all four of the cats were female, and none of them were spayed. Sandy and Buffy were Lucy's kittens from last year, and without intervention the property owners knew that all four cats were likely to have at least one litter of kittens in the spring. While the people liked the cats, they didn't want to create more, and the cost to spay and

vaccinate all four cats through their regular vet was more then they could afford. The property owners started looking for another solution. Fortunately, they happened upon a sign advertising free spay & neuter for outdoor cats.

Thanks to PetSmart Charities, the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook had funding to spay and neuter 468 barn, stray and community cats last April. As soon as they

saw the offer, they made appointments for all four cats. They planned to catch the cats in a large dog crate. On the morning of the surgery, Lucy and Sandy saw the delicious tuna fish in the back of the dog crate and went in for it. (Buffy and Tina were leery of the change in routine and decided to see what happened. Figuring two were better than none. Lucy and Sandy were loaded up and transported to the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook.

What no one knew at the time was that Lucy had a

secret: she was not only pregnant again, but her kittens were ready to be born. Lucy settled into the soft bedding in the crate and let nature take over.

In an effort to keep cats calm while they wait for surgery, we turn the lights off and close the doors in our cat area. This is so they are not exposed to barking dogs, and the commotion in the prep

and surgical areas. The cat is brought into prep area when it's time for his or her surgery. When it was time for Lucy and Sandy's surgeries, the entire dog crate was brought into the prep area.

#### Saving Lives at the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook

The Spay Spa & Neuter Nook, Rude Ranch's high quality, low cost spay & neuter clinic is a large part of fulfilling our mission to end the euthanasia of healthy animals because of overpopulation. Every day the clinic spays and neuters animals from many areas within Maryland, Delaware, Virginia and Washington DC. The clinic opened in October, 2012 and is quickly approaching our 20,000th surgery. (As July 1, 2016, we've done 19,297 spay and neuters!) We've even neutered a couple of unusual species: an opossum for a wildlife sanctuary and Wocket, the sugar glider!

We always enjoy meeting and interacting with the animals that come into our clinic, and especially like to see the trends in animal names. Maggie, Chloe, and Daisy are still very popular names for female dogs while different versions of Samson,

Sammy and Sam are very popular for male dogs, both big and small. Diesel is also popular for a lot of the bigger dogs, and Denali is the most common name for Siberian Huskies. Whiskers, Kitty and Pumpkin still reign as popular names for cats. We did have a Lover Boy that totally lived up



to his name and wanted to be carried around. As always current TV shows and movie characters are very popular. Although we don't see to many "Ziva"'s any more we still see several Leroy's and Jethro's from NCIS. There are a lot of Game of Thrones fans as we've had a lot of Khaleesi's, Cersei's and Gregor's. DC Comic's Batman and friends is still popular as we've had Two Face, Batman, Robin and several characters from "Gotham". Some people must have been hungry when they named their pets: Oreo, Cookie, Nacho, Waffle, Sushi, Bacon and Bubble Gum visited us this year!

# Ask Tommy: Advice from Our Feline to Yours

Welcome to the latest edition of Ask Tommy where your four-footed and feathered friends can ask Tommy for advice on how to handle humans. Tommy's life experiences include a brief career as a kitty condo model, food taster, and shelter spokescat. At the ripe old age of 20 he's now "writing" this column to pass his wisdom on to the next generation of felines.

Dear Tommy,

I've got an embarrassing problem!!!! It's my litterbox.... it's scary!!!! I'm afraid to use it!!!! I know my people bought it just for me, but it's a big closed in box and when I'm in it I hear all kinds of noises and can't see what's happening. It feels like everything is closing in. Sometimes the dog sticks his head in while I'm using it and traps me. It smells too! I know if I don't use it I will be in REAL trouble! What do I do?

Boxed In

Dear Boxed In,

I can understand your problem with the litterbox, especially having a dog stick his head in while you are doing your "business". While it is tempting to not use a scarey or unpleasant litterbox, not using it will get you in a lot more trouble. "Not using the litterbox" is the reason most people surrender a cat. You need to get your humans to work with you quickly.

As you stated there are many things that can make you or any cat not want to use your litterbox. First off, do go to a veterinarian for a thorough check up to make sure you don't have any physical issues. Then start looking at the litterbox itself. Cats are a lot like people: one size does not fit all! Like

people some cats are claustrophobic and an enclosed litter box freaks him or her out. Other cats prefer an enclosed box for more privacy. Have your humans check the location of your litterbox. Is it out in the open where there is lots of noise and commotion with people and other pets going through? We cats like our privacy too! Have your humans move the box to a quieter area that is away from main traffic areas in your house. (And definitely the dog!) Do you live with other cats? If so, make sure your humans have at

least one litter box per cat. There's nothing worse than having to wait in line or jumping in a litter box that has just been used! You also might want to have your humans buy you unscented kitty litter. Even though the humans don't notice it, we cats are a lot closer to the litter and the scent can be overpowering.

If you've already had an accident, make sure your humans clean it properly. Use an enzyme based cleaner and let it soak into the surface. Definitely don't use anything with ammonia! That will just make you want to mark on top of it!

Try these suggestions at your house to make you and your humans happy!

## Community Cat Outreach Project Gets Liftoff

We are excited to announce that the Anne Arundel County Administration is publically supporting its first Community Cat Outreach Project. The Project will be led by Rude Ranch and the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook in partnership with Sunshine's Friends, Cats R Us and the SPCA of Anne Arundel County. The goal is to demonstrate how the county and its citizens will be better served with the addition of a Trap Neuter and Return (TNR) program to control the county's population of stray and community cats. We expect to start the project in September in Hillsmere Shores, a neighborhood within Annapolis. Project volunteers (this could be you; let us know!) will work with the community to address concerns, fix cats, and educate citizens about spay/neuter and keeping cats inside. The project gives the Anne Arundel County Police, Animal Control and Dept. of Health an opportunity to build relations and expand its environmental health programs at no cost to the county (Rude Ranch, through its' charitable grants, will fund the project). The project will enable citizens to solve a (cat) community issue with the support (but not funds) of local government. It does not take away other solutions but rather provides a preventative tool.

Our end goal is to get the Animal Control county code updated so it differentiates community cats from owned cats and reduces needless euthanasia. Please join us in helping the animals that cannot help themselves. Call the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook at 443.607.6496 for more information.

Imagine our surprise when we lifted the blanket off the crate and saw Lucy and two kittens snuggled up to her belly!

Although the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook is not set up to care for neonatal kittens, we were able to move Lucy and her kittens to another large dog crate away from the noise and other animals for the rest of the day.

Lucy's family didn't know what to do. If they put Lucy and her kittens back in the barn, there was a good chance the kittens would be attacked and killed by wildlife. They could try to care for the small family in their house, but Lucy would not let them touch her and even at a few hours old, she was fiercely protecting her kittens. She bit and clawed anyone who tried to touch them.

Fortunately for Lucy, Spay Spa veterinary technician Stephie Rye was in that day. Stephie is the Spay Spa's head anesthesia tech and has a soft spot for sick, injured, and neonatal kittens. Stephie offered to take Lucy and her kittens home and care for them until the kittens could be adopted and Lucy could go back to working in the barn. The first few days were not easy for Lucy or Stephie. Lucy did not trust anyone and certainly did not want anyone to touch her precious babies. Even though she was grateful for the food, every time

the door to her crate opened, she hissed and swatted at the hand or plate. Eventually Stephie and Lucy worked out a deal: Stephie would open the crate and approach Lucy with a roll of paper towels, Lucy would swipe and beat up the paper towels while Stephie checked the kittens, changed the litter box and gave them food and water. This arrangement worked until the kittens were ready to start eating on their own.

At 5 weeks the kittens were big enough to start exploring on their own. By now they were starting to get on mom Lucy's nerves so she was fine with them leaving her for short periods of time. Soon the kittens were coming out of the crate every night, learning to cuddle, play and interact with humans. The kittens, a boy and girl, were soon named Fish and Oswald.

By now, Fish and Oswald were independent from Lucy and ready to take on the world. Lucy came back to the Spay Spa & Neuter Nook and was spayed. Buffy and Tina finally cooperated and came in on the same day. All three cats went back to their barn and started working again a few days later. Fish and Oswald have stayed with Stephie while they look for forever homes. This is one surprise that has a very furry ending!


